Statement of Faith

To be signed by all members of the New Mexico Bible Institute Board, Administrative Staff, Faculty and Student Body.

1. We believe that the Bible is verbally inspired in the 66 books of the Old and New Testaments as originally written by the writers who were directly controlled by the Holy Spirit of God. This revelation from God is complete and final, and without error in the original autographs.
2. We believe in the tri-unity of God: that the eternal God manifests Himself in three persons; God the Father, God the Son, and God the Holy Spirit, and that these three are one God, but separate in personality and work.
3. We believe in the incarnation and virgin birth of Jesus Christ; in His sinless life, and in the sufficiency and substitution of His death on the cross for the sins of the whole world; in His bodily resurrection from the dead and His millennial kingdom after the tribulation period.
4. We believe in the creation of the universe and all living things by a direct act of God, apart from any ‘so-called’ evolutionary process.
5. We believe in the fall of man and the subsequent depravity and sinfulness of the whole human race, making man incapable of personal salvation and good works before God.
6. We believe that man’s greatest need is personal salvation by grace through faith in Jesus Christ as Savior and Lord, apart from any works of the law or any human merit.
7. We believe in the bodily resurrection of believers to everlasting life and fellowship with God, and of all non-believers to everlasting torment and punishment.
8. We believe in the spiritual unity of all believers who are regenerated, baptized, in-dwelt, and sealed by the Holy Spirit for an effective Christian life and witness.
9. We believe that God’s plan for this present age involves the evangelization of the world through the witness of every believer in Jesus Christ, and the establishment and growth of local churches as the means of accomplishing His purposes.
10. We believe that, whereas there may be several applications of any given passage of Scripture, there is only one author’s original intended meaning. The student of God’s Word diligently applies the literal grammatical-historical method of interpretation under the enlightenment of the Holy Spirit (John 7:17; 16:12-15; 1 Corinthians 2:7-15; 1 John 2:20).

Origin and History of School

New Mexico Bible Institute was founded in 2009 for the purpose of providing quality undergraduate Biblical education. It is the intent of the school to offer classes convenient to the schedules of those who are working and to keep the costs as low as possible for this type of instruction.

Today, New Mexico Bible Institute graduates will lead the charge by being involved in missions on each continent, in pastorates and Christian schools here in the United States, and as pastors wives. General Information

The basic philosophy of the Institute is based upon the need for Biblical background and practical experience in the lives of believers who desire to serve Christ in the ministry of the local church. It is the desire of New Mexico Bible Institute to provide the opportunity for a Bible education combined with practical experience for all those who are seeking it. To meet this need, we have established the following objectives:

Philosophy and Objectives

1. To operate a non-denominational Bible Institute that concentrates on training people for ministry in the local church.
2. To develop a class schedule that meets the needs of students engaged in full or part-time employment.
3. To emphasize the practical training of the individual student in the ministries of the local church by means of a faculty dedicated to the ministry of the local church.

It is not within the objectives of the Bible Institute to provide courses of instruction in the fields of liberal arts education. Students who desire to pursue fields of occupation that demand a liberal arts degree should seek that training elsewhere.

The central offices of the Institute and the library are located at 5629 Paradise Blvd NW in Albuquerque, New Mexico 87114 (near the intersection of Lyon and Paradise Blvd). Classes are conducted in the facilities of Alive In Christ Bible Church.

Location

The growing library of New Mexico Bible Institute is currently being built one book at a time. The library is primarily in the subjects of Bible, Theology, Missions, Church History, and the Biblical languages.

Library

Students are encouraged to avail themselves of the many fine and extensive public and academic libraries in the Albuquerque area and surrounding communities.

Student Information

Admission Requirements

Academic

The courses of the Institute are designed for those who are high school graduates. While all are invited to take classes, only those with a high school diploma or its equivalent, shall be eligible for one of the undergraduate degrees. All students must maintain a 2.0 grade point average throughout their academic program in order to graduate. Any student taking more than 16 units in any quarter must secure permission from the Academic Dean.

Spiritual

It is the intention of the Institute to admit students who manifest the “fruit of the Spirit” (Galatians 5) and are personally committed to Jesus Christ. Each student must be “born again” (John 3) and desire to serve the Lord in whatever capacity he may choose for his life. Each student will be expected to have a regular ministry in a local church while attending the Institute and will be required to state it on each quarter’s registration form. Students who manifest the “works of the flesh” (Galatians 5) and show an attitude of rebellion toward authority and the things of the Lord will be dismissed.

Moral

While recognizing the seriousness of divorce in the over-all testimony of the Christian, the classes of the Institute are available to all who feel called of the Lord to take them. Thus, the school will admit divorced students who give us an explanation of the circumstances of their situation.

Social

While recognizing the principles of “Christian Liberty” (I Corinthians 8-10; Romans 14), the Institute requires that students refrain from smoking, the non-medical use of drugs, the drinking of alcoholic beverages, and the use of profanity. Students engaged in these practices will be subject to dismissal.

Admission Procedure

1. Complete the Application form and return it to the Office of the Registrar with the Application fee at least four weeks before the beginning of the quarter.
2. Sign the Statement of Faith” form and return it with your application.
3. Request that official transcripts from all schools, high school and beyond, be sent directly to the Registrar.
4. Furnish a recent photograph of yourself.

Official admission will be granted after these documents have been received.

After paying the regular audit fee charges, any student may audit classes without filing the application form.

Audit

New Mexico Bible Institute’s Non-discriminatory Policy

New Mexico Bible Institute admits students of any race, color, national and ethnic origin to all the rights, privileges, programs, and activities generally accorded or made available to students at the school. It does not discriminate on the basis of race, color, national and ethnic origin in administration of its educational policies, admissions policies, scholarship program, and school- administered program. All students are required, however, to sign the Statement of Faith on the back of the application.

Transfer Students

Applicants in good standing at the last college attended may have classes transferred. The units from another college will be evaluated on the basis of:

1. Course content (whether or not it is similar to our course offerings in content, textbooks, and amount of work required.)
2. Grade earned. (No course is transferrable if grade earned is a D or less.)
The student is responsible for supplying a school catalog, official transcripts, and any other information needed for an evaluation.

The \$25 application fee must be paid before any evaluation will be done. Any transfer student must complete a minimum of 48 quarter units at New Mexico Bible Institute before a degree from NMBI will be issued.

Tuition and Fees

The following fees are subject to change from year to year, but it is the sincere desire of the school to keep all costs at a minimum for the benefit of the student, and yet, adequate for the effective operation of the school.

Application Fee \$25.00

This fee is payable only once and must accompany the student's application for admission. It is not refundable.

Late Application Fee \$30.00

Students can apply for admission after the deadline (four weeks before the quarter) for any given quarter by filing slate application.

Tuition per Quarter Hour Unit (13 and over) \$95.00

Tuition per Quarter Hour Unit (3-12 units) \$100.00

Audit Fee per Unit \$70.00

Late Registration \$10.00

After the registration period each quarter.

Program Change \$5.00

This charge includes adding or dropping of any courses after the second week of classes.

Transcript Fee (First copy - no charge) \$10.00/copy

Graduation Fee \$180.00

This includes cap and gown rental, degree pictures, breakfast/banquet, and announcements.

Return Check Fee \$25.00

Due to the moderate tuition and fee structure of New Mexico Bible Institute, students are asked to pay for the courses at registration each quarter and at the beginning of the summer session. If a student is unable to pay in full at registration, he can, if approved by the bookkeeper, pay the account on the following basis: one-third of the total amount at registration, one-third 30 days after the beginning of classes, and one-third 60 days after the beginning of classes. (A carrying charge of 2% on the balance carried 1-30 days and 5% on the balance carried 31-60 days will be assessed.) Class attendance will be granted only to those students who have demonstrated a good record of tuition payment.

Payment of Accounts

Final Examinations cannot be taken unless all bills are paid or prior arrangements have been made with the Institute Office.

Tuition will be refunded on the following basis

During the first week of class	100%
During the second week of class	90%
During the third week of class	70%
During the fourth week of class	50%
During and after the fifth week of class	No refund

Refund Policy

Percentage is determined from full tuition charges.

A student who is dismissed will receive no refund.

Withdrawal from any class must be made using a withdrawal slip obtained from and filed in the Institute office. Failure to file the withdrawal slip in the school office will result in the student's remaining academically and financially responsible for all classes indicated on the registration form. Students must file a formal Withdrawal From Class form whether the class was attended or not.

Student Life

Dress

While New Mexico Bible Institute has no stated dress code, we expect our students to be attired neatly and modestly as befits a Christian.

Housing

While the school does not have any available housing for students, the office will assist a student in acquiring housing in the area.

Chapel

Several times during each quarter, special speakers will take part in a one-half-hour chapel service. These are announced each quarter.

Christian Service Activity

The Institute feels strongly the need for practical experience in sharing with others the spiritual truths being learned in the classroom. For this reason, our students are requested to be involved in some aspect of ministry through their local church. A new student has one quarter in which to locate a ministry. Each student is required to register that activity (at least one week commitment per year) at the time of registration each quarter.



Academic Programs and Policies

To meet the needs of our students, the Institute offers a Certificate Bible Program, the Diploma in Biblical Studies, the Bachelor of Arts In Bible, Bachelor of Arts In Bible with Missions Emphasis, and the Bachelor of Arts Christian Education degrees.

The B.A. degree program is designed to give Biblical understanding combined with the basic New Mexico General Education requirements for a Bachelor of Arts degree.

The student is required to complete 52 semester units at a Liberal Arts College. These are then transferred into New Mexico Bible Institute and combined with the programs where to complete the B.A. program.

No student may graduate with an academic degree who does not maintain a grade point average of 2.0 or above.

Incomplete [I] Incompletes will not be issued automatically. Students must obtain a Petition for Incomplete Form from the Institute office and file before the end of the quarter. A \$3.00 charge will be assessed for each petition. The Dean will determine the date in consultation with the instructor when the work of approved incompletes will be due. Failure to meet the new deadline will result in the Incomplete-Failure (I-F) recorded on the transcript. The I-F grade cannot be removed, but a student may repeat the class and better that grade.

Withdrawal [W] This indicates that the student has been permitted to withdraw honorably from the course.

Academic Probation Any student whose cumulative grade point average falls below 2.00 (C) will be placed on academic probation. At this point, the student will be required to have directed counsel as to his classes and study habits. His unit load will be limited at the discretion of the Dean's office. The student has two quarters to show marked improvement in grades and class work, if the student's grade point average does not show improvement, he may be dismissed by the Academic Dean.

Graduation Graduation exercises will be conducted once each year. All candidates for academic degrees will be awarded degrees on that occasion. Students unable to attend should give written notice to the school, making arrangements for receiving their degrees in absentia.

Academic Honors The institute will award the following to those students who have completed a minimum of 96 units at New Mexico Bible Institute toward the Bachelor's degree. The G.P.A. for Honors will be determined from units earned at New Mexico Bible Institute and units transferred.

Courses of Instruction

All courses at the Institute are taught within a quarter and the unit value of a course is a quarter unit hour. Where a course has a prerequisite, the previous course or courses must be taken for a student to enroll in the class.

The major goal of this department is to teach and train the student in his knowledge of the Bible. The authority of the Bible is recognized as the basis for all spiritual growth and ministry.

OS 101 **Bible Study Methods I**

An introduction to the inductive method of Bible study designed to equip the student to study the Bible for himself.

BS 102 **Bible Study Methods II**

An application of the principles learned in 101 to the Gospel of Mark. Further exposure will be given to other Bible study methods so that each student can develop his own Bible study program.

Prerequisite: BS 101

BS 103 **Bible Survey I: The Pentateuch**

A survey of the Pentateuch with a synthetic study of each of the books, Genesis to Deuteronomy.

3 units

BS 104 **Bible Survey II: The Historical Books**

A survey of the history of Israel with a synthetic study of each of the books, Joshua to Esther.

3 units

BS 105 **Bible Survey III: The Prophets**

A survey of the Old Testament prophets with a synthetic study of each of the Old Testament prophetic books.

3 units

BS 106 **Bible Survey IV: The Wisdom Books and Psalms**

An introduction to the book of Psalms and a synthetic study of Job, Proverbs, Ecclesiastes, Song of Solomon, and Lamentations.

3 units

BS 107

Bible Survey V: The Gospels and Acts

A survey of the Gospels with a synthetic study of each of the books, Matthew to Acts.

3 units

Bible Survey Vi: The Epistles and Revelation

A synthetic study of each of the books, Romans to Revelation.

Bible Backgrounds

A survey of the topography and climate of Bible lands, followed by a survey of Biblical history and archaeology.

BS 117	Romans An analysis of Romans with particular emphasis upon the teaching concerning God's salvation as it is developed in this book. Prerequisites: BS 102, 108	3 units

Apologetics

An introductory study of Christian evidences designed to demonstrate and to defend the factuality of Biblical Christianity.

DA 211 **Apologetic Systems** 3 units
 A detailed study of the Biblical justification of apologetics, its history, and systems of contemporary evangelical thinkers.
 Prerequisite: DA 210

DA 215 **Theology of the Cults** 3 units
 A study into the major cults of Mormonism, Christian Scientists, and the Jehovah's Witnesses, with student projects on other cults.

DA 216 **Jewish Culture and Evangelism** 3 units
 A study of Jewish culture, teachings, and customs in both ancient and modern times, emphasizing principles in reaching them with the gospel of Jesus as Messiah.

DA 217 **Science and The Bible** 3 units
 Basic issues will be dealt with such as the origin of the solar system, the age of the earth, the problems of evolution, the universal flood, etc.

Department of Biblical Languages

The purpose of this department can be stated by the following objectives:

1. To give the student a basic understanding of the original languages of the Bible.
2. To equip the student with language skills that will enhance his ability to study God's Word.
3. To prepare the student for further graduate work should the Lord lead in that direction.

BL 301, 302, 303 **Elementary Greek** 4, 4, 4 units
 An introduction to the elements of Koine Greek (all three quarters must be taken to receive credit).
 Prerequisite: 48 units of N.M.B.I. credit

BL 304, 305,306 **Greek Syntax and Exegetical Method** 3, 3, 3 units
 An introduction to Greek syntax and its application to accurate Biblical interpretation. A practical system of exegesis will be introduced with emphasis upon the solution of textual and interpretive problems (all three quarters must be taken to receive credit).
 Prerequisites: BL 301, 302, 303

Department of Historical Studies

The purpose of this department is to give the student a basic knowledge of the growth and development of the Christian church from the times of the apostles until the present day. Emphasis will be laid upon the great leaders of church history and the practical lessons we can learn today from their testimony and work.

HS 401 **Ancient and Medieval Church History** 3 units
A study of the development of the Christian church from the apostolic age to eve of the Reformation.

HS 402 **Modern Church History 3 units** 3 units
A study of the development of the Christian church from the Reformation to the present.
Prerequisite: HS 401

HS 403 **American Church History 3 units** 3 units
A study of the growth and development of the Christian church in America.
Prerequisite: HS 402

HS 405 **Church History Reading Course 3 units** 3 units
A directed reading program in selected areas of church history designed for Individual students who have completed Church History 401, 402, 403. May be repeated.

The goal of this department is to challenge the student to reach the world for Jesus Christ. The courses will seek not only to impart this vision, but also to give practical, Biblical Instruction as to how the goal of world evangelization can be reached and the part each student can have in It.

Department of Missions and Evangelism

ME 501 **Evangelism Training I: Personal Evangelism** 3 units
An introduction to personal evangelism where the student will be trained to share his faith in Jesus Christ.

ME 502 **Evangelism Training ii: Discipleship Ministry** 3 units
A survey of the many kinds of and tools for discipleship being used today, with specific instruction and training in how to disciple a new believer. Prerequisite: ME 501
